Grade Configuration Outcome

Thank you for providing your input about possible future grade configurations. We had over 2,300 people give feedback, which was very helpful to the Board in making a grade configuration decision and will provide valuable insights as we make plans moving forward.

The surveys clearly indicate that grade configurations of K-5 in elementary schools, 6-7 in middle schools, 8-9 in junior high schools, and 10-12 in high schools would be in the best interest of Nebo School District both financially and in providing other

benefits to students and parents, such as creating direct feeder patterns.

In January, the Nebo School Board of Education voted to have the Superintendent and administration proceed with necessary preparations for a November 2018 Bond Election that would NOT increase current property tax rates.

The Board also directed the Superintendent and administration to prepare for the Bond Election by planning the construction of three new middle schools to be opened in 2020 and 2021.

Preparation will include remodels to several existing school facilities to support a middle school design.

During this same timeline, the following items will be considered and addressed: schedule design, instructional model, licensure requirements, teacher assignments, transportation, etc.

Thank you again for providing your feedback. We are excited about the future of Nebo School District and look forward to making this transition to having middle schools in the district once again.

Retiring 2016-17?

Nebo is offering an Early Retirement Notice Incentive to those who have their retirement approved by the Board of Education before mid-February. The details are as follows:

- Any employee who is eligible for and retires from Utah Retirement System (URS) by June 30, 2017, can submit the final paperwork to the District by:
 - ♦ February 3, 2017, to receive \$500 in their February 28 paycheck.
- The final application deadline for this Early Retirement Notice Incentive is February 3, 2017.
- This incentive is a one-time option for those who will retire at the end of the 2016-2017 school year.
